# 6<sup>th</sup> Annual INTERPROFESSIONAL EDUCATION (IPE) DAY

2021 was an extraordinary year for IPE Day. Not only did the pandemic require the event's shift from its traditional in-person gathering to a virtual offering, the Planning Committee was tasked with organizing an event for more than 1,000 students from three universities – the largest cohort ever!

This year, the event's curriculum focused on Indigenous health care and health equity. In order to ensure their readiness for leading groups of health care learners, facilitators received an Indigenous Cultural Safety Training package prepared by Ms. Amanda Kennedy, an Indigenous social entrepreneur. Fifty-nine Master of Public Health students from Western University also received this ICS training directly via videoconference. Trained in managing group facilitation, these graduate students were deployed to support the facilitation of the 102 student groups with over 85 other facilitators who were recruited from a variety of health care disciplines.

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An IPE Day panel presentation kicked off the event featuring Dr. Anna Gunz, a pediatric intensive care physician from London Health Sciences Centre, and Ms. Samantha Dokis, a PhD candidate in sociocultural anthropology and an Anishinaabe Kwe Scholar. The discussion focused on both environmental health and the impacts of environmental racism on Indigenous communities.

Following the assembly, learners moved into one of 102 Zoom breakout rooms where they spent the afternoon building their

knowledge through role clarification and case analysis activities. This year's case was written by Ms. Dokis and Mr. M. Sam Cronk, a Digital Humanities Consultant and Cultural Scholar with over two decades of experience working in consultation with Indigenous communities on collaborative initiatives. The case, centred on the Asupeeschoseewagong First Nation in northwestern Ontario, allowed learners to explore their own disciplines and those of their teammates, learning how health care professionals can best collaborate to provide quality care to Indigenous patients and their families.

Special thanks Dr. Danielle Alcock, Indigenous Leader, Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry, for her efforts in recruiting content experts to participate in the event. Similarly, Dr. Alcock was instrumental in preparing and encouraging her Indigenous Health Master of Public Health students to participate as cofacilitators – a vital component of this year's event!

Learners from 10 programs across the University of Waterloo, the University of Windsor, and Western University participated representing dentistry, medicine, nursing, nutrition, optometry, pharmacy, and social work in this key introductory session to explore professional roles, build communication skills, and a better understanding of collaborative practice.
